## Pastor's Letter

**Dear Friends in Christ,**

What does it mean for a congregation such as ours to have an “outward focus”? You might remember, when we received the prescriptions from the Transforming for Mission consultation team last summer, that their number one concern was the lack of outward focus at Our Redeemer and their number one prescription was to begin a visioning process to determine how we could best spread the gospel outside of the church.

Congregations possessing an “inward focus” are congregations that are seen as being primarily in ministry to their current members. Being concerned about the spiritual needs of the members of our congregation is certainly not a bad thing. We want our members to be people who are growing in their faith and receiving support and encouragement as they seek to live as Christians.

But it dare not stop there. We have been called as Christians not simply to exist, to spiritually “tread water” waiting for Christ to call us home to heaven. We are instead called to be “salt” and “light” in a sin-darkened world. Like the patriarch Abraham we have been blessed in order to be a blessing to those around us. “God has made us what we are, and in our union with Christ Jesus he has created us for a life of good deeds, which he has already prepared for us to do.” Ephesians 2:10.

*Pastor's Letter (continued)*

In doing so, we follow the example of our Lord, "who did not come to be served, but to serve and to give his life to redeem many people." Matthew 20:28. Service is, and should be, the identifying mark of Christians and the church.

In their book, *The Externally Focused Church*, Rick Rusaw and Eric Swanson tell the story of Lifeboat 14. "On April 14, 1912, the Titanic struck an iceberg in the North Atlantic and began taking on water. By the time the lifeboats were deployed, it was clear that the ship was sinking. Passengers were loaded into lifeboats, and the lifeboats were lowered into the icy waters. Of the twenty lifeboats lowered into the water, most had room for more people. Despite the cries for help, those in the lifeboats were afraid to return to the drowning people lest the boats be swamped. Resisting the cries for help, the people in the boats rowed away from hundreds of people floating in the water.

"In Lifeboat 14, Fifth Officer Harold Lowe thought differently and acted differently. He transferred many of his passengers to other lifeboats and returned to the sinking ship to pick up more survivors. Though he could not save them all, he could save a precious few from death in the icy sea. Survivors rescued survivors." While outwardly focused churches care for those who are already in the boat, they are defined by going after those who are still in the water.

In the upcoming months our mission/vision task force will be taking a hard look at our community to find ways in which we can show God's love through real and relevant acts of service. To again quote Rusaw and Swanson, "By becoming externally focused, churches have the chance to build relational bridges, giving Christians opportunities to share God's grace in the midst of real need. In this way, the church can transform lives as people both see and hear God's grace at work in their world." Please keep this effort in your prayers.

## Remember Haiti Earthquake

As news of what is being called the largest earthquake to hit Haiti in more than 200 years reached LCMS World Relief and Human

Care (LCMS WR-HC) on Tuesday (1/12), the Synod's mercy arm began preparing to reach out in the Caribbean nation with much needed assistance and working in cooperation with Lutheran partners. Only hours after getting reports of the magnitude 7.0 earthquake, the Synod's mercy arm announced it was making available funds to meet initial emergency needs. "The unfolding drama in Haiti calls for unlimited mercy on the part of the people of the LCMS. The needs are urgent and overwhelming right now," said Glenn F. Merritt, LCMS WR-HC director of Disaster Response. "I appeal to God's people to respond as generously as possible during this most difficult time."

LCMS WR-HC is working cooperatively with LCMS World Mission, Haitian missionaries, partner churches, and the LCMS Florida-Georgia District to provide relief in a timely fashion. Funds are urgently needed to help Haitians who have lost loved ones and homes.

## What is LWML ?

*(Summarized from the LWML website)*

**T**he Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) is the official women's auxiliary of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS). For over 65 years, the LWML has focused on affirming each woman's relationship with Christ, encouraging and equipping women to live out their Christian lives in active mission ministries and to support global missions.

**History** "There's no question the church is behind you because in so many ways you are ahead of the church." With those words, a Lutheran historian applauded the progress of the LWML since its founding in 1942. Its roots, however, go back nearly a century earlier.

Beginning in the 1850s, women of the LCMS started local auxiliaries to meet the needs of people, mending clothes for seminarians, equipping hospitals, establishing schools, developing convalescent and retirement homes, assisting orphanages and residences for people with disabilities, gathering clothing, furniture and food for indigents, and funding mission endeavors at home and abroad. Not until the 1920s, however, did members of congregational societies begin to coordinate their efforts by uniting in state and regional leagues. Oklahoma was first in 1928, but it took more than a decade before official approval was granted for a national LCMS women's

organization. If you are interested in LWML's history, along with a timeline of organization 'firsts', check out [www.lwml.org](http://www.lwml.org).

The LWML has long history in Our Redeemer. You can see some of the pictures from the past in the corner of Aloha Room, next to the sink (see if you can recognize some faces). Their next Bible Study will take place on February 18, 2010 at 6:30 PM in the Aloha Room (third Thursday of the month). The study is from the LWML Fall 2009 Quarterly and is entitled "Balancing on Solid Rock." If you would like to join up for dinner, meet in the upper lot at 5:30 PM to walk down to the Greek Kitchen (or be dropped off there). Apart from the activities at congregation's level, the ladies also meet with members from other churches. ## Why celebrate Valentine's Day?



**V**alentine's Day began with a prison ministry. In 320 A.D. the early church set aside February 14 to remember the heroic death of a man named Valentine. He was beheaded because he refused to denounce Jesus Christ.

According to tradition, Valentine was born into a wealthy Roman family and converted to Christianity around 240 A.D. At this time the church was severely persecuted by the Roman emperor, Claudius II. Thousands of Christians were imprisoned in the jails of Rome. Wealthy Romans were invited to visit the prisons and watch Christians being tortured and put on death - as a form of entertainment. Valentine used this opportunity to visit the prisons and smuggle in small gifts of food to the martyrs. He expressed encouragement and love for them and the love of Jesus Christ. He was eventually arrested and was martyred about 270 A.D. His ministry of love is still commemorated today.

We should all remember the Christian roots of worldly traditions and appreciate the blessings that come from showing love to one another...

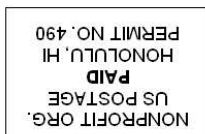
